



Street Vet

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Arizona Humane Society has a street vet program called Project Resolution. If an Investigator goes to a call for service and determines that the family needs assistance with medical treatment for their and can't afford it, an appointment is scheduled for them a veterinarian and Emergency Animal Medical Technician (EAMT) to come their house to provide medical care; free of charge.

The program started in August of 2023 as a pilot program where the EAMT and veterinarian were going out to the field twice a month, but the success of the program has sparked weekly field visits beginning in January of 2026. Project Resolution is keeping pets in their homes and out of the shelter. Many of the pets treated would have been seized due to lack of veterinary care.

Arizona Humane's data has proven that it is less expensive to treat the pet in the home than it would be to seize the pet, and treat it in the shelter.

What's in the bag for home visits?

- **EAMT backpack:** IV fluids (LRS and NaCl), lines, Diphenhydramine, dextrose, bandaging supplies, betadine, isopropyl alcohol, miscellaneous catheters/needles/syringes, PPE, all size basket and mesh muzzles, small/large nail clippers, suture scissors, ear and rectal thermometer
- **Vet backpack w/ cooler component:** vaccines, K-9 Advantix/Credelio (all weight ranges), Dexium, Carprofen, Cephalexin, Miconahextriz mousse, blood tubes, styptic powder (Quick Stop), pill cutter, empty prescription bottles w/ blank labels

Additionally, if other prescriptions are warranted, our Trauma Hospital Pharmacy can fill them and then the EAMT will deliver the next day.
